their review copies, a proper review of volume eight of A New History of Ireland could be written. Since they are, and since the book retails for the astonishing price of \$89, whoever has the book should say something about it, if only to let people know that it exists. That "whoever" is the editor, who had to do some fancy horse-trading to get a

Volume eight (1982) is A Chronology of Irish History to 1976, edited by T.W. Moody, F.X. Martin, and F.J. Byrne. To say that historians need this book is an understatement. For too long, they have had little more than the equivalent of calendars and newspaper columns from which to glean a year-byyear chronology. Scholastically, historians have had to rely on the work of their British counterparts, and there are several excellent British books which contain valuable Irish material (such as, for instance, Powicke and Fryde's Handbook of British Chronology).

Moody is Fellow Emeritus of Trinity College, Dublin, and Martin and Byrne are at UCD. Together, they have compiled a masterful 600-page book of the most important historical dates. (No modesty here; they even include the publication date of their New History of Ireland, vol. seven: August 5, 1976). The index is over 125 pages long, and finding anything is a snap. The material is, properly, historically oriented, but there are literary dates, too. The dates begin at 2,000,000 B.C., but don't be put off by that. In only a few pages, they're up to 432 A.D., the traditional date of St. Patrick's mission.

This book is not for amateurs or geneaologists. It's for the professional historian and for every library that is visited by one.

Travel Free* to the Convention

Go to Wake Forest in Comfort and Style With Your Friends and Colleagues

Next year's annual ACIS convention will be in Wake Forest, North Carolina, on May 3-5, 1984. As part of an effort to save money as well as to have some fun, a group of ACIS members are renting a full car on AMTRAK. A minimum of 15 fares will reduce the regular \$174 round-trip price by 25%, down to \$131 at present rates. (By comparison, flights from N.Y. to Winston-Salem are about \$260; from Boston about \$280; and from Chicago about \$310.) Fortyfour fares will gives us a full car to ourselves. With a full car, we will get one free ticket* which will be awarded in the time-honored draw-the-name-out-of-a-hat tradition. For every 20 tickets after that, there will be another free ticket* awarded.

The train will leave Manhattan's Penn Station on Wednesday, May 2, at 2:30 p.m., and will arrive in Greensboro, N.C., around midnight. Dillon Johnston, organizer of the conference, will greet us at the station with transportation to the hotel and either a ceili band or church choir, whichever is available. The conference will begin the following afternoon (Thursday), thereby en-

suring rest for all of us. The return trip will arrive back in Penn Station around noon. Sunday, May 6. AMTRAK has agreed to provide us with a separate lounge at Penn Station on May 2, and we expect there to be a free bar in the lounge to fortify us for the

The train will have complete dining facilities as well as a cafe car, and it will handle checked baggage (2 carry-ons and 3 more up to 150 lbs.). If there is enough interest for a full car, it will be separated into smoking and non-smoking sections. The train will make stops in New Jersey at Newark and Trenton; at Philadelphia, Pa.: Wilmington, De.; Baltimore, Md.: Washington, D.C.; and in Virginia at Alexandria, Manassas, Culpepper, Charlottesville, Monroe, Lynchburg, and Danville. Members may board the train at any of these stops, but they will not be eligible for the group-fare ticket. Instead, they should purchase the Excursion fare which is 15% off the regular round-trip. They can ask the conductor to direct them to the ACIS car (the one with the tattered tri-color).

As is well known, airline fares into New York are substantially lower than fares for similar or shorter distances. Members may find it cheaper to fly into N.Y. and board the AMTRAK rather than to negotiate the several stops it may entail to fly to Wake Forest. Those arriving at LaGuardia Airport (preferred) or JFK on the day of departure should arrive by noon for transportation to Penn Station. New York-area ACIS members will assist those arriving by air.

Those interested should formally contact Robert Lowery, editor of the ACIS newsletter, at 114 Paula Blvd., Selden N.Y. 11784, as soon as possible. It is expected that the fare will have to paid in full by March 1. Follow-up detailed instructions will be sent before the departure date.
