#### **Temporary Dues Adjustment**

In order to make the transition in dues from the calendar year to the academic year, the ACIS Executive Committee has authorized the following temporary adjustment in the dues schedule for 1986-87. The next dues period will extend from January 1, 1986 through August 31, 1987. The amount due from regular members upon renewal will be \$21 for that period of twenty months. This adjustment does not constitute any increase in dues. It is only a temporary modification which takes into account the longer period during which benefits will be granted. As of September 1, 1987, the annual dues will again be \$14 on an academic-year basis. Appropriate adjustments will also be made in the dues of students, retirees, and foreign members for 1986-87. It will be indicated in the individual dues notice to be sent to all ACIS members in November


