ACIS Book Prizes

President James S. Donnelly, Jr. has announced the following winners of the ACIS book prizes for 1990:

- 1. Alvin Jackson's <u>The Ulster Party: Irish Unionists in the House of Commons, 1884-1911</u>, has been declared the winner of the 1990 Donald Murphy Prize awarded for a distinguished first book.
- 2. J. J. Lee's <u>Ireland</u>, 1912-1985: <u>Politics and Society</u>, has been declared the winner of the James S. Donnelly, Sr., Prize for History and the Social Sciences. In addition the prize jury awarded Honorable Mention to David M. Emmons's <u>The Butte Irish</u>: <u>Class and Ethnicity in an American Mining Town</u>, 1875-1925.
- 3. R. B. Kershner's <u>Joyce, Bakhtin, and Popular Literature</u>: <u>Chronicles of Disorder</u>, has been declared winner of the Prize for Literary Criticism and Related Fields.

Vice-President Mary Helen Thuente has announced that three ACIS book prizes of \$500 each will be awarded in 1991 in the following categories.

Category One: Includes works in literary criticism, literary history, folklore, Irish-language studies, the history of art and architecture, the history of music, the history of ideas, and intellectual history.

Category Two: Includes all other works of history and the social sciences.

Category Three: Includes the first books of junior scholars.

The 1991 competitions will cover books published anywhere in the world in 1990. Eligibility is to be unrestricted by nationality, place of residence, or ACIS membership status. Nominations may be made by either the author or the publisher. The entry deadline is 1 April 1991. It will be the responsibility of the author or the publisher to ensure that copies of the nominated books are in the hands of each of the three members of the proper evaluation committee (listed below) by 1 April 1991.
