Nicola McCartney:

Among Nicola McCartney's current commissions are *Seven Devils* for Traverse Theatre, *The Lion of Kabul* for Catherine Wheels, *All Legendary Obstacles* for the Lyric, Belfast/Abbey Theatre, Dublin (2006), *Whaleshow* for Vanishing Point (2006) and *Krom* for the National Theatre, London.

Her play for children *The Millies* was produced by Replay in Belfast and will be touring Ireland in 2006; her play *Lifeboat* was chosen as the Best children's Play, TMA Theatre Awards, 2002

Her drama *Convictions* was produced by Tinderbox Theatre Co., in Belfast in 2000 as part of the Crumlin Road project.

She has written extensively for television, film, and radio. In addition to her writing, she has worked as a director and dramaturge. She has held academic appointments with University of Glasgow, University of Ulster, Strathclyde University, Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, University of Bradford. Currently she is a Creative Writing Fellow at the University of Edinburgh.

Dawn Duncan:

Dawn Duncan, secretary of International Association for the Study of Irish Literatures, also has a second life in the theatre. Dawn has been acting since at the age of 8 she played the central role of Margaret in "Miracle on 34th Street" in Dallas. By the time she entered her teen years, she had added writing and directing to her resumé. Dawn earned an M.Ed. in Theatre from the University of Texas. She remains active as an actor, director and writer. Favorite roles include: Joan in Saint Joan, Annie Sullivan in The Miracle Worker, and Carrie Watts in Trip to Bountiful.
