

ABOUT ACIS

The American Conference for Irish Studies was founded in 1960 as the American Committee for Irish Studies, and is a multidisciplinary scholarly organization with approximately 800 members in the United States, Ireland, Canada, and other countries around the world. Each spring, the ACIS holds a national conference attended by 300 - 400 people from the academic community and the general public. The 2011 International Meeting of the ACIS will take place at the University of Wisconsin – Madison on 30 March – 2 April 2011.

Each fall, meetings are held in the New England, Mid-Atlantic, Midwest, and Western regions; the Southern regional takes place in the winter. The ACIS also sponsors joint sessions with the American Historical Association and the Modern Language Association at their annual conventions.

Both national and regional meetings include plenary speakers, academic sessions in all fields of Irish Studies, poetry and fiction readings, films, and performances of Irish music and plays.

ABOUT ACIS-WEST

The Western Region of ACIS comprises the states of Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.

The American Committee [later Conference] for Irish Studies first met in 1984 in Tacoma, WA. Irish Studies Enthusiasts from the west coast began a discussion that ended with the forming of ACIS-West, which held its first conference in October 1985 at the University of San Francisco.

In 2003, the Western Institute of Irish Studies was formed, and in 2005, WIIS was incorporated and approved for non-profit status. In 2006, the first issue on the site's online journal Siar, published a selection of papers delivered at the 2005 conference.

In 2004, ACIS-West began presenting the Willard Potts and Don Jordan Emerging Scholar Award in honor of the organization's founding members and early presidents. The Emerging Scholar Award goes to the best conference presentation and paper submission by an Emerging Scholar.







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FEATURED POET - TREVOR JOYCE



Trevor Joyce co-founded New Writers' Press in 1967, and was a founding editor of the influential journal of poetry and criticism, *The Lace Curtain*. His early publications included *Watches* (1968) and *Pentahedron* (1972). *The Poems of Sweeny Peregrine*, a working from the middle-Irish Suibhne Gealt, appeared in 1976.

In Dublin and Oxford he conducted seminars and lectured on classical Chinese poetry, and visited the People's Republic of China as a poet at the invitation of the Chinese government in 1983. Having read Philosophy and English at UCD, he moved to Cork where he read Mathematical Sciences in UCC.

In 1995, NWP issued stone floods, his first publication in almost twenty years. In 1997 he co-founded SoundEye: The Cork International Festival of the Arts of the Word. Having worked in industry for many years, he became a full-time writer in 2000.

He has published numerous papers on contemporary poetics, twice conducted the advanced poetry workshop at the Listowel Writers Week, and lectured and given public readings of his work throughout

Ireland, the U.K., Europe and the U.S.A. He was text-editor of *On Art, Possibility & Democracy* (2006).

Recent work explores the possibilities of found text, computer-mediated composition, and writing under constraint. He has produced workings from classical Chinese poetry, from Hungarian, Finno-Ugric and Turkic folk-songs, and from anonymous materials out of the Irish folk tradition. A prose assemblage, *STILLSMAN*, was exhibited in the Vinyl Project in 2005, and has been presented as a performance work by Art / not-art.

A collected poems to 2000 was published as with the first dream of fire they hunt the cold (2001). More recent collections include What's in Store (2007) and Courts of Air and Earth (2009). He has been a Fulbright scholar, and was Visiting Fellow in Poetry to Cambridge University for 2009/10. He is a member of Acsdána, the Irish affiliation of creative artists.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER - CHRISTOPHER MURRAY



Christopher Murray is a former Director of the Drama Centre and a member of the Department of English at University College Dublin. He has written extensively on modern and contemporary Irish drama, including Twentieth-Century Irish Drama: Mirror Up to Nation (1997) and Sean O'Casey; Writer at Work: A biography (2004). He was editor of the Irish University Review for several years and served as Chair of the International Association for the Study of Irish Literatures.

Christopher Murray is associate professor of drama and theatre history at University College Dublin. He is the author of Twentieth-Century Irish Drama: Mirror Up to Nation.

Present Position: Emeritus Professor of Drama and Theatre History, School of English, Drama and Film, University College Dublin, Belfield, Dublin 4, Ireland

Former Employment: Assistant Lecturer in English, NUI Galway (1962-65); Assistant Professor, Department of English, University of New Haven, Connecticut, (1968-70); visiting professor University of Antwerp (UIA), 1990; visiting professor Waseda University, Tokyo (1993); visiting professor at University of Pecs, Hungary (1995).

FEATURED FILMMAKER - CAROL MOORE



Carol has been an actress for 30 years and was nominated Best Actress in the 1988 European Film Awards for her role as the 'model' in *Reefer and the Model*. Carol co-founded Charabanc Theatre Company in 1983 and remained a co-Artistic Director and actress with the company until its closure in 1995. Carol performed last year in Kabosh's site-specific production *Two Roads West* by Lawrence McKeown but in the last number of years has been making films.

In 1997 Carol's short film adaptation of Cathal O Scarcaigh poem *Gort an gCnámh* won four awards in 1998 including Best First Time Director at the Celtic Film Festival and Foyle Film Festival. She received a NESTA fellowship in 2005 to enable her to explore and develop ideas surrounding diversity, integration and migration. These include *The Farther, The Dearer, This Belfast Thing and History Unfinished* (Northern Ireland regional winner of the BAFTA 60 SEC 2008 film competition). Carol's debut feature film *Pumpgirl* by Abbie Spallen (Holywood Productions) previewed at the Belfast Film Festival in 2009.

Angeline Kearns Blain was born in Dublin in 1938. She emigrated to the United States in the late 1950s, married and had three sons. After raising her family she enrolled in basic education classes, continuing to university where she earned an MA degree. She has been Adjunct Professor of Sociology and Women's Studies for twenty years at Boise State University, Boise, Idaho. Her publications include Tactical Textiles: A Genealogy of the Boise Peace Quilt Project, articles on the peace women and women, Stealing Sunlight: Growing up in Irishtown, and I used to be Irish: Leaving Ireland, becoming American.
